An update on the work of Local Support Organisations



What are LSO?

LSOs or Local Support Organisations are a Union Council level federation of Community Institutions. In a bid to reduce poverty at the household level and empower marginalised people (esp. women), they carry out community-led development and develop linkages with government and non-government organisations.



Activities implemented through the EU funded SUCCESS Programme



Activities implemented through self-help and in collaboration with Government and other development agencies:

- 1. Conducted **3,480 awareness sessions** educating **76,560 individuals** on various poverty, health and education topics
- 2. Planted **700 trees** in different villages of the UC
- 3. Enrolled 1,280 children (750 boys and 530 girls) in school
- 4. Facilitated the vaccination of 7,500 individuals against COVID-19
- 5. Registered **5,960 CNICs, 178 B-forms, 200 Nikkah Namas** and **180 death certificates** in the Union Council
- 6. Vaccinated **304 animals** with the help of the Livestock Department
- 7. Treated **5,500 patients** for free through a medical health camp with the help of the Government Health Department

Women leaders of **LSO Missan** are planning and implementing development activities both on a self-help basis as well as in collaboration with government agencies. The EU-funded SUCCESS program is empowering rural women in Sindh by realising the power they gain from collective action. The organised women are gaining awareness about their rights, making the service providers accountable, and are also taking self-initiative to improve their lives.

Promoting Education and Learning

Due to poor socioeconomic status of rural communities in Sindh, the parents face multiple challenges in affording school supplies for their children. Therefore, "Waseela-e-Taleem" scholarship, as provided by Benazir Income Support Program (BISP), is an initiative to support the students from poor households. However, it was inaccessible for children in Ghulam Ali Laghari village due to lack of proper information about the procedure to avail it. The leaders of Local Support Organisation Missan discussed this issue in their meetings and decided to meet with BISP representatives. They identified the number of children in their community and submitted application forms on their behalf. This helped the students in availing this scholarship, which facilitated them in buying the necessary school items, like books, uniforms, shoes, bags and stationary. Now the villagers are left with no reason to keep their children from attending school.
